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
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

The Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship has become a tour de force on the North American doubles schedule.

ith the women getting stronger and no longer intimidated by the power of the men, we are witnessing better and better partnerships and no where is this

more evident than in the recent Canadian Mixed.

Good, young players such as Scott Mikalachki, Jim Paton, Don Benson and Rob Warden are eagerly joining the ranks to challenge the veterans of the stature of Victor Harding and Alan Hunt.

Once again, and for the second consecutive year, the spectators at the Fitness Institute were treated to another "points

in the fifth" final - in fact, both finals were ended in this heart-stopping fashion.

The Open event began on Thursday night at Mayfair Lakeshore with a minor upset coming from Leslie Freeman and Don Benson over Jennifer Smith and Jim Paton. Down two match points, Freeman/Benson squeezed by 17-16 in the fifth. A Friday night second round match at Fitness Willowdale saw another upset with more serious implications, with the fourth seeded team of Karen Jerome and Mike Guyatt of Hamilton Thistle being overwhelmed by the backhand corner volleys of Scott Mikalachki and the cool steadiness of Cathy Covernton. Jerome and Guyatt could not get on balance and went down three to one.

Quarter final matches now saw the interest turn to the proven Ontario champions, Alan Hunt and Barbara Diggens as they took on the reigning U.S. National Mixed champion, Joyce Davenport of Philadelphia and her partner, Paul McDonald of Toronto. Coming back to tournament play as a personal favour to tournament officials, Paul joined Joyce in stopping Hunt and Diggens in a great match-points again in the fifth.

Moving up the draw, the two young teams of Leslie Freeman and Don Benson and Scott Mikalachki and Cathy Covernton battled point for point with the latter team coming through 3-1 over a tired Freeman and Benson who were playing their second match within three hours.

Moving along into one of the top half quarters, Victor Harding and Lolly Gillen won 3-0 over Carin and Ward Meek but not before 2 games went into extra points. Playing against Victor on the left wall is a lesson! Long recognized as the best doubles tactician in Canada, you also have to contend with his imposing physical presence and vast talent.

The defending champions, Americans Julianne Harris and Brian Callaghan showed in the top quarter against Robert Frost and Gail Pimm that their number one seeding was right on! The left handed Harris, playing good, tough cross courts and the very fast Callaghan, who makes a doubles court look small, defeated a very promising young team 3-0.

Semi final matches brought out every talent and every piece of subtlety in squash doubles - the 'never playing a bad shot to lose court position when a let can be called' - 'the very nervy delayed clear, leaving your opponent just enough room to hit the ball' - 'arguing a let call or appealing a get knowing you won't win the call but knowing you have allowed your partner some breathing room after three consecutive tough gets up at the front wall' - we saw them all in the match between Harding/Gillen and Callaghan/Harris.

Looking from the gallery, the obvious strategy was for Harris to continuously play the cross court deep and for Callaghan to pound the ball up the right wall, hoping for a weak return from Gillen.

Match point proved elusive for Harris and Callaghan

Lolly, on the other hand, was trying to get the ball deep to Harris so Harding could take advantage of his reverse corner or straight backhand drop. As the match wore on, Lolly's right front corner became vulnerable to Callaghan's reverse corner and Harris' front wall side wall drops. The score was 3-1 to Harris and Callaghan.

In the other semi final, between Mc-Donald and Davenport and Mikalachki and Covernton, the match stood at two games each with the latter on the brink of an upset. But now, with the experience of Davenport in a fifth game and a tired but still retrieving Paul McDonald, Mikalachki and Covernton had to play as well as they ever had. A number of errors going for quick winners put Scott and Cathy in a deep hole out of which, ultimately, they could not climb. It is tough to be brilliant in the fifth game but they are fast becoming one of Canada's best teams.

Finalists in the Open event brought two partners together but now to play against each other. Harris and Davenport have won numerous big tournaments as a team but this time Harris was playing with a familiar partner and Davenport with a partner unknown to her before the tournament.

McDonald and Davenport won the first game but two more tough games put Harris and Callaghan up two games to one. With a comfortable lead in the fourth, Harris and Callaghan reached match point but could not put it away. They proceeded to fritter away a 14-10 advantage and made the call of set three when McDonald and Davenport caught them at 14 all. Paul and Joyce won the set 3-1 and the match now stood at 2 games each.

The final game was a repeat of the fourth with Harris and Callaghan again reaching 13 points only to have McDonald and Davenport catch them. With the call now set 5, Harris and Callaghan slipped through for an 18-15 victory and their second consecutive Canadian Mixed title.

But the Canadian Mixed was not an all-American affair. In the Seniors event, all four top seeded teams ended up in the semi finals. In the top half, Dick Will and Sharon Schwarze from Philadelphia had a clear edge in defeating Toronto's Peter Frost and Cathy Reid 3-0. In the bottom half, the second seeded team of Paul Frost and Jane Mitchell edged Ed Bracht and Susan Swift 3-1.

The final proved to be a very even match with each game forever in doubt. Down 10-14 in the fifth, Will and Schwarze came back to tie the match at 14 all. Paul Frost then made an unnerving call of 'no set' and Jane Mitchell then came through with a winning cross court for the match.

Many thanks to the Cricket Club, the Granite Club and, of course, the host Fitness Institute, for the use of their courts. And one final note. The tournament would not have been the success it was without the 'phone network of Lolly Gillen and the superb refereeing of Lindsay Smith.

After the dust had cleared in the quarters and semis, Gary Waite and Jamie Crombie squared off in the final. There was little that Jamie hit that Gary could not retrieve. Gary handled Jamie's power easily and Crombie's drop shots were just not tight enough to prevent a counter attack. The 9/1, 9/4, 9/3 Waite victory was indicative of the play.

The women's draw featured 13 of the top Ontario ranked players and gave Ottawa fans an opportunity to see western Canada's Sandy McBean and Shauna Flath. The quarter final matches provided us with the first major upset as Canada's top junior, Melanie Jans, defeated Shelley Harvey 3/1 and Jo Thomas provided an early game scare by losing a close 9/7 game to Amanda Humble, winning the second 8/10 before Amanda shut the door by not allowing Jo to score another point.

Heather Wallace won her semi final match against Alberta's Sandy McBean fairly handily but it was the second semi which proved to be a real crowd pleaser. It was a match up of the young Melanie Jans against the experience of Amanda Humble. Melanie took the first game 9/7 by hitting the ball to length and forcing Amanda to constantly hit from the back. This was the pattern of the match as play seesawed back and forth. In the end, it was Amanda's tight drop shots which helped her overcome her youthful competitor, 3-1.

The final match was an enjoyable and friendly game between the two veterans. Heather Wallace and Amanda Humble with Wallace prevailing 3-0.

Jeff Watts and his Queensview crew of Rob Sandal, Randy Lacrois, Linda Bowes and Richard Buston did a superb job organizing the event. 


